

Growers who held their nerve and harvested after October rains were rewarded, says Linda Murphy, who finds there is still imbalances between these neighbouring regions

DECANTER'S TASTING OF 2009 Californian Cabernet Sauvignon drilled down to the state's two most prominent regions for the variety, Napa Valley and Sonoma County. Cabernet Sauvignon grows throughout California – some 32,000ha worth – yet it is in Napa (7,885ha) and Sonoma (4,654ha), the Hollywood and Beverley Hills of the wine scene, where the vast majority of stars reside.

Napa, of course, has all the cachet. Sonoma, Napa's neighbour on the west side of the Mayacamas Range, has success that Napa has been unable to beat in the production of Zinfandel, Chardonnay and Pinot Noir, but none of Napa's Cabernet Sauvignon charisma; and yet its Cabs can be sneakily good, and they're getting better.


Sonoma County wineries also don't seem to have the same devotion to *Decanter* Cab tastings as do the Napans, and that's a shame. It's also understandable, as few Sonoma producers at top Cabernet level export their bottles (Peter Michael is an obvious exception, and Kendall-Jackson is stepping up its UK export efforts). Sonomans are more laid back about such things, although competition is convincing growing numbers of them to sell their wines abroad, and be seen in *Decanter*.

Dollar divide

Pricing is a common divide between Napa and Sonoma Cabernets. a \$100 Napa Cab is typical, a \$100 Sonoma one a rarity. Sonoma doesn't have a Harlan, Bryant Family or Screaming Eagle to push prices well past the \$600 mark – which can be a good or a bad thing, depending on one's view – and grape prices (usually reflected in the final bottle price) are stupendously higher in Napa. The 2011 average price per ton of Cabernet Sauvignon grown in Napa County was £2,800, and the highest was £18,752. Sonoma averaged £1,717 per ton, with a top price of £4,050.

The 2009 vintage for Napa/Sonoma Cabernet
Sauvignon was cool for these generally warm regions, and
June was downright cold. But the fate of the harvest came
down to one decision: whether to harvest not-quite-ripe
grapes before an approaching mid-October rainstorm, or
cross fingers that the sun would come out after the storm,
allowing grapes to dry out and complete the maturation
process. The latter did indeed occur, and winemakers who
had the patience (and past rain experience) produced some
beautiful, complex wines. Those who jumped the gun
found themselves with underripe fruit and green wines.

The late storm triggered some mould, although the most accomplished wineries sorted out the infected fruit before fermentation. This reduced yields, but was crucial.

Decanter PANEL TASTING

The results

High alcohols and uneven quality in the generic-level wines marred what was otherwise a fine tasting, with our experts recommending most wines for good medium-term drinking. Tina Gellie reports

A SOLID AND enjoyable tasting, according to our experts, showing off what California's premium Cabernet regions do best - but also highlighting their low points.

'Wines in the modern idiom,' remarked David Motion. 'Very juicy, concentrated and clean. There was a lot of oak - sometimes unwelcome - and a lot of alcohol.' Given the growing conditions, Stephen Brook was happy not to find dilution or rot, but while he was encouraged by some very burn - it wrecks the wine. If I want Port I'll go out and buy good wines, 'it was inconsistent; there were poor ones too'.

The main complaint was high alcohol. For Brook it was 'a real defect' in otherwise good wines. 'There's no reason, even in Napa and even with global warming, to have 15.5% or 15.8%. Some wines stated they had 14.2% or 14.3% [tasters are told the alcohol] but they weren't in balance, because the Californians are allowed to lie about alcohols.'

There is a 1.5% legal tolerance in California, so 15% on the label can mean anything from 13.5% to 16.5%. Brook said: 'In my view that's unethical. It explains why some wines don't look that alcoholic on paper but knock you over when you taste them. It's a huge drawback, and it applied to some of the more expensive wines. In all other respects the wine was terrific; I just don't want that alcohol 'The highlight was the centre of Napa: Oakville, Stags Leap & Howell Mountain' Yohann Jousselin MS

Port. It will cost me less and give me as much pleasure.'

In terms of the generic wines (blends from across the region), Brook noted angular acidity and a lack of fruit in Sonoma County but found many in Napa 'a major disappointment... unbalanced, jammy, low in acidity and lacking freshness, which is essential when you've got that intensity of fruit'.

Motion pointed out that generic Napa included cheaper bottlings as well as more serious ones. Yohann Jousselin reckoned 'you can find great generic Napa Cab at £10 to £12 a bottle', but Motion and Brook weren't so sure. 'You could end up with something fairly horrific,' said Brook.

When it came to specific AVAs, opinions were more positive. 'Everything went up a gear,' said Motion. 'The

Stephen Brook


Brook's verdict

'With more than 600 wines bearing the Napa appellation, and a few hundred more with Sonoma on the label, it's not easy to get an overview of the vintage even after 82 wines. For the most part they were balanced.

'There were disappointments among the generic wines, for the obvious reason that they encompass both very serious wines from important producers and commercial bottlings from larger companies. Most of the best were in the individual AVAs, with Alexander Valley, as so often, showing well in Sonoma, and all in Napa displaying individuality and quality.

'Excellent though many of the Sonoma wines were, it was Napa that demonstrated the grandeur and splendour of Cabernet Sauvignon. There were magnificent wines, and my average scores were high: this is a vintage that can be bought with confidence. Sub-regional typicity is hard to pin down, with only Stags Leap standing apart with discernibly elegant, balanced wines. Some acidities seemed low, and this may not be a vintage for the long haul. And the curse of deliberately overripe, wildly alcoholic wines continues to dog Napa Cabernets.'

Yohann Jousselin MS



Yohann Jousselin MS was until recently head sommelier at The Vineyard at Stockcross, Decanter's 2012 Restaurant of the Year (see p84). Responsible there for a cellar comprising over 30,000 bottles, many Californian, he was voted Chaine des Rotisseurs' Young International Sommelier of the Year in 2009 and Piper Heidsieck's UK Sommelier of the Year in 2011.

Jousselin's verdict

'A great tasting; I really enjoyed the

diversity of the vintage. I first tasted 2009 last year in Napa, and at the time I was already very impressed by the balance of most of the wines. Today's tasting was very difficult as there were many wines with a high concentration of ripeness. I like 2009 as an overall vintage but I do think that the best wines are those with higher acidity.

'Unfortunately, the wines from Sonoma were not showing as well as expected. Most of them were very closed and had alcohol levels that were slightly too high. I think those will need a bit more time before they are ready to show well. The generic Napa wines were very consistent in quality and showed a great potential for ageing. But the highlights of the day for me were the wines from the northern part of the Napa Valley, especially Diamond Mountain and Howell Mountain. Those wines showed greater complexity and elegance.

'This tasting has confirmed my opinion of the vintage. Cabernet Sauvignon from Napa in 2009 has a high potential for ageing; the wines are rich and opulent. I think the best results are to be found in Diamond Mountain, Howell Mountain, Rutherford and Stags Leap.'

wines were much silkier; the quality of the fruit was great, and even when there was a ton of oak you could see that everything was beautifully done.' Jousselin agreed: 'Alexander Valley definitely showed much better than other parts of Sonoma. But the highlight for me was the centre of Napa: Oakville, Stags Leap and Howell Mountain. The best had great acidity and round tannins. Because of the sweetness on most, if the acidity was there it gave back-up.' Brook favoured Diamond Mountain, as well as Stags Leap for its 'usual elegance and balance'.

In terms of identifiable regionality, Jousselin said Stags Leap was the only AVA that stood out, thanks to its 'acidity, freshness and minty character'. Motion and Brook agreed, the latter adding: 'It's very difficult to talk about subregionality in Napa. People do it glibly all the time, but I think that if you asked them to pick out blind which is which, most would stumble.'

As for longevity, 'it's hard to know what they will do,' said Motion, 'but from experience the best Californian wines last for decades.' Jousselin felt that the more restrained wines would age best: 'Most were very ripe and lacking acidity and I fear that in 10 years' time they will be tired.' Brook recalled the opulent 1997 vintage, which has held up less well than cooler 1991 and 1994. 'Time will tell, but 2009 is an excellent year. The quality at the top is very, very good.'

With a craggy face, handsome mustache and cowboy hat, Randy Dunn is Napa Valley's original mountain man. He embraces Howell Mountain's volcanic soils, 600m elevations and the thick-skinned, tannic grapes grown there. Always 100% Cabernet Sauvignon, they show the herbal side of the variety, and are 14% alcohol or less, even if Dunn must use reserve osmosis technology to reduce the potency.

Stephen Brook Rich, comforting black fruits nose, with an elegant toastiness. Medium-bodied, ripe and almost sweet without being jammy, concentrated and sleek, and with a touch of alcohol just about carried by the fruit. Very good length, harmonious and complete.

Yohann Jousselin MS A supremely elegant wine. This shows a lot of ripe red fruits that are balanced by lovely acidity. It's a lighter style of Napa Cabernet Sauvignon, yet still contains great complexity.

David Motion Blackcurrant leaf and savoury notes on the nose. Palate is cool and polished, comprising flavours of blueberry, blackcurrant and sea salt.

Women rule at Oakville Ranch. Londoner Mary MacInnes Miner and her American husband Bob Miner purchased Oakville Ranch in 1989, but Bob's death in 1994 left Mary in charge. She now relies on general manager Paula Kornell (daughter of pioneering Napa Valley sparkling wine producer Hans Kornell) and winemaker Anne Vawter to enhance the brand. The 'token' male is vineyard manager Phil Coturri, a buddy of Grateful Dead band members and proponent of organic practices. Oakville Ranch is a sleeper among superstars - its wines become more complex with every vintage.

SB Super-ripe blackcurrant nose, with minty notes. Rich but firm, with some welcome austerity. The palate is less flamboyant than the nose, with robust tannins. Has ample acidity and persistence, but the fruit quality is excellent, as is the balance.

YJ A ripe style of Cabernet Sauvignon from Napa, it offers a lot of baked, dark fruit aromas given plenty of freshness due to the acidity and vegetal character of the wine. Great balance.

DM A lovely, deep wine with intense levels of concentrated, brambly fruit. A dense, generous offering with plenty of structure and a very long finish.

David Motion

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David Motion is owner of London merchant The Winery, which is known particularly for its selection of Italian, Spanish, German and Californian wines.

Motion's verdict

'2009 seems to be a homogeneous, easy-to-like vintage in both Sonoma and Napa. Across the board the wines were well made, mainly in the modern idiom. Stand-outs for me were those that evoked classic Napa and Sonoma

Cabernets from the 1970s and 1980s - wines that are enjoyable to this day. At generic level, the wines were solid, if occasionally lacking some excitement. Many of the basic Napa Valley appellation wines were highly alcoholic and those with stated alcohol levels over 14.5% frequently tasted more like Zinfandel than classy Cabernet Sauvignon.

'The sub-regions were a big step up in quality, more focused and expressive, with clear terroir specificity. Alexander Valley is worth drawing attention to on the Sonoma side. The high-altitude AVAs, such as Spring Mountain, Howell Mountain and Diamond Mountain, really showed their breeding, as did Stags Leap District and Oakville on the Napa Valley floor.

'It was a pleasure to see such a spread of names from different eras making delicious wines: long established names such as Mondavi, Philip Togni and Trefethen, through to some that seemed to rise in the 1990s such as Staglin and Whitehall Lane and, more recently, Cliff Lede. I was also excited to see some unfamiliar names. I will be hopping on a plane shortly!'

Expert summary: Linda Murphy

A disappointing tasting in comparison to the 2007 and 2008 vintages, but strong individual performances from producers old and new provided several high points

THE RESULTS OF these 2009 Californian Cabernets are disappointing when compared to *Decanter*'s evaluations of the 2007s and 2008s. The 2008s produced four Outstanding wines and 2007 five; there are just two from 2009. At the Highly Recommended level, 2009 had a mere 16, while 2008 and 2007 shone with 38 and 43 respectively.

It could be argued that with this 2009 tasting focusing on Napa and Sonoma (and not all California Cabernets, as has been done in the past), the number of top scorers would decline because of fewer candidates. This isn't the case. Of the Outstanding and Highly Recommended picks from the 2008 vintage, for example, only one was from outside of Napa and Sonoma.

Those who say vintage doesn't matter in California should consider themselves wrong after the outcome of this tasting. True, rarely are there disasters in Napa and Sonoma, yet some vintages are more problematic and dramatic than others, and 2009 was one of them. The cool growing season was punctuated by three days of heavy rain in mid-October that forced winemakers to either harvest early, before the rain, or trust that Indian summer conditions would follow. If half the producers chose the first option, and half the second, one can expect half as many Outstanding and Highly Recommended ratings.

Our three experts were able to recognise the beauty lurking behind the Dunn Vineyards Cabernet, always tightly wound and begging for a long sleep in the cellar. The other Outstanding wine, from Oakville Ranch, is an under-the-radar flyer that has been a consistent high scorer at *Decanter* tastings over the past three years.

Betty O'Shaughnessy, Dunn's Howell Mountain neighbour, is a rising star. Her Cabernet, made by Sean Capiaux, just missed Outstanding status. If she is a relative newcomer, Philip Togni of Philip Togni Vineyard (17.25/90+pts) has quietly made superb Cabernet with Bordeaux leanings on Spring Mountain since 1981.

Californian Cabernet is still Napa Valley's show, although Alexander Valley Vineyards, established nearly 40 years ago in Sonoma's Alexander Valley by the Wetzel family, scored well with its Alexander School Reserve. Yes, old-school vintners can still get it done.
